What is PET/CT?

A PET/CT is a fusion of functional (PET) imaging combined with CT (anatomical) imaging. PET/CT provides quantitative metabolic information about the whole body, and is most commonly used for oncology and dementia imaging.

What will happen during the examination?

On arrival you will have your blood sugar level checked and a plastic cannula placed into a vein in your arm.

The PET/CT scan involves an injection of a radioactive tracer through the cannula.

You will rest for 60 minutes in a darkened, quiet room prior to the scan. It takes this time for the tracer to accumulate in metabolically active areas and clear from the rest of the bloodstream. The injection has no side effects.

The scan takes approximately 15-20 minutes.

Depending on your history, your doctor may also request you to have a diagnostic CT, which is performed on the same camera. If your CT study requires contrast, this will be discussed with you prior to the scan.

Pregnant and/or breastfeeding patients

This examination is not suitable for pregnant women.

Breastfeeding mothers should contact our department prior to their appointment to discuss any specific preparation. You will need to express and discard milk, but can resume feeding after your appointment.

After the examination

Our radiologist will review and report on your images.

For your convenience we generally deliver the images and report to your doctor.

Location and car parking

PET CT is available at our City West and Windsor Gardens clinics. Both clinics have free onsite patient car parking available.

Windsor Gardens patient parking is located out front of the 480 Specialist centre building.

For City west patients, free parking is available on level 3 of 18A (in the multistorey car park directly behind our building). Patients can take a ticket at the boom gate and simply present it to our staff for validation.

Patient preparation

The information below is relevant for most PET scans. However if you are a diabetic, then please refer to specific information later in this document.

- you will need to fast for 6 hours prior to your appointment - only plain water may be consumed during this time
- > your blood sugar level must be below 11mmol/L – diabetic patients please refer to specific instructions below
- > it is important you are hydrated please drink 3-4 glasses of plain water (warm if possible) prior to your appointment
- > medications (excluding diabetic medications) may be taken as normal
- > no strenuous exercise/movement in the 24hrs prior to the scan (including gym/weight lifting, gardening etc)
- > no chewing gum or mints on the day of your scan
- > you will be resting for 60 minutes in a quiet room after your injection
- > wear warm, comfortable clothes with no metal
- > if there is any chance that you are pregnant or breastfeeding, please contact us prior to booking
- > if you are claustrophobic, please advise staff when booking.

Additional preparation for diabetic patients

Please contact our City West or Windsor Gardens clinic for instructions. You will be required to monitor your blood sugar levels prior to eating in the 3 days before your appointment. If it is above 11mmol/L please call us to discuss.

Diet controlled/Type 2 diabetics

- > fast for 6 hours as per previous instructions
- > metformin (and similar medications) may be taken as normal.

Insulin controlled

- you will ideally be given a midday appointment
- > eat a light breakfast (for example, some juice and a piece of toast) early morning with normal medication and fast for 6 hours
- > Insulin should be taken a minimum of 4 hours prior to your scan.

Uncontrolled/long-acting insulin

- you will ideally be given the first appointment of the day
- > fast overnight do not take your insulin in the morning
- > bring your medication with you to have after your scan.
